#### **SPELLING RULES**

## 1. The F, L, S, or Z Rule (the "floss" rule)

When you have a **one-syllable** word, with **one** short vowel, that ends in **f**, **l**, **s**, **or z**, **double the f**, **l**, **s**, **or z**.

(exceptions: if, pal, us, bus, yes, gas, this, Gus)

**Examples:** puff, tell, miss, jazz

## 2. The 1-1-1 Doubling Rule

When you have a **one**-syllable word, that ends with **one** consonant, after **one** vowel, you DOUBLE the final consonant when adding a **VOWEL** suffix.

Examples:  $\sin + ing = sinning$ 

sin + ful = sinful

## 3. The Silent-E Dropping Rule

When you have a word that ends with a silent e, you drop the e before adding a **VOWEL** suffix.

Examples: pave + ing = paving

pave + s = paves

# 4. The Y-Changing Rule

When you have a word that ends in a y after a consonant, you change the y to i when adding a non-i suffix.

Examples: happy + ness = happiness

carry + ing = carrying

play + ful = playful
