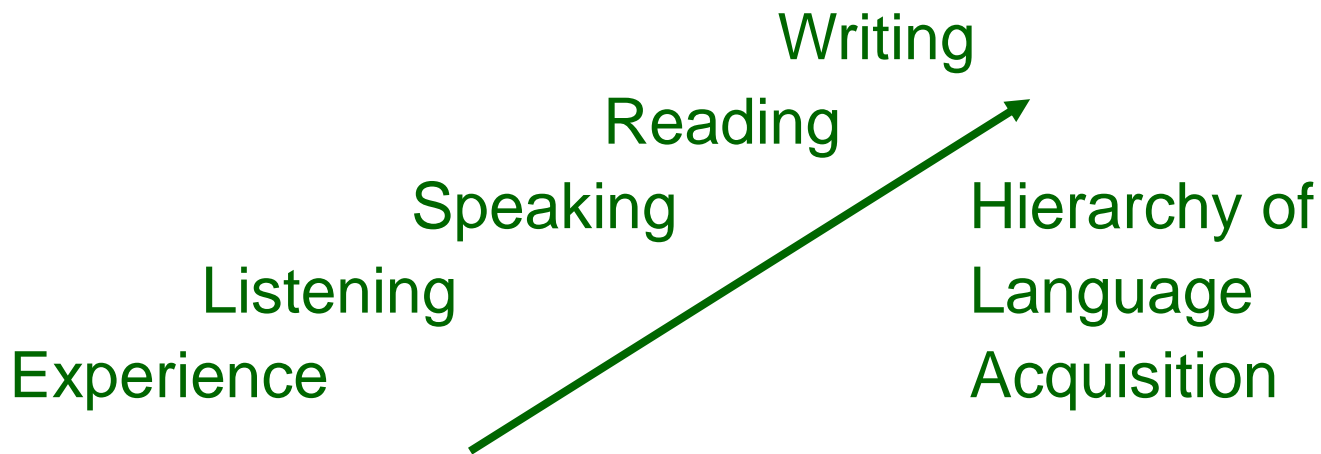

Decoding Procedures

- Underline vowels and letter combinations
- Divide between syllables
- Read
 - Vowel sounds first
 - Syllable by syllable to form base word
 - Base word, then add suffixes, then prefixes

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Encoding Procedures

Oral only, Oral to paper, or Paper only

- Vocalize the word, with arm swing
- Identify number of syllables in base word
- Identify first syllable
 - Determine vowel sound & spelling
 - Repeat syllable
 - Identify each sound/spelling in order
- Continue with following syllable(s)
- Add affixes, applying rules as appropriate

Doubling Rule

b.w. **vc'** + v suffix run + er = runner

Dropping Rule

b.w. **e** + v suffix save + ing = saving

Y-Rule

b.w. **cy** + non-i suffix carry + ing = carrying

happy + ness = happiness

b.w. **vy** + any suffix joy + ful = joyful
